Teachers told: You plug in, you pay up

Schools try to save by charging for use of fans, fridges

Got a desk clock in your office? How about a small fan, a little extra light or even a mini-fridge?

Plugging in those personal amenities at work will cost teachers and employees money in a small, but growing, number of school districts. By making employees who bring in fans, space heaters and other small devices pay a fee to offset the electricity those appliances use, district administrators think they have a promising new way to help control costs after years of budget cuts. Grosse Pointe Public Schools initiated a "pay to plug" measure last spring, and Chippewa Valley Public Schools is considering doing the same for this fall.

"We don't want to cut services for kids or families," said Chippewa Valley spokeswoman Diane Blain. "Pay to plug is just asking employees to step up and help us. Whether or not it will be implemented still remains to be seen."

Chippewa Valley estimates it would offset at least \$25,000 in electrical costs with its system, whether staff members pay the extra fees or decide not to bring devices in because of it. The district cut \$4.7 million out of its \$120-million budget for the upcoming school year.

Grosse Pointe expects to save \$35,000 to \$45,000 per year with its restrictions.

"We actually did it a couple of years ago and the reaction was pretty strong, and we rescinded it," said business manager Chris

Fenton. "We're doing it again this year, and we got a little bit of negative feedback, but it wasn't as overwhelming because most people know of the delicate financial situation at the state level."

Fenton said the plan is part of an overall package of energy-saving measures, including more efficient boilers, windows and lights.

"Now we're trying to adjust the human factor, turning off lights, turning off computers, and pay to plug," Fenton said. "If you take all of those pieces, they all add up and you can get to \$100,000 pretty quick, and now you're looking at the cost of a couple of teachers."

Teachers nationally are already spending an average of \$500 per year for school supplies, said Doug Pratt, director of communications for the Michigan Education Association, the state's largest teachers union, which represents both districts

"I have no problem talking about energy conservation, but when we're talking about school districts telling teachers they can't bring a fan from home into the classroom to help make the learning environment more livable for students, that really shows the financial situation of the state," Pratt said.

"If we're at the point where we're pinching pennies and unable to run pencil sharpeners, there's obviously not enough revenue coming in," he said.
